Breakout #1: Integrating Care Pathways and Clinical Guidelines: Optimizing Outcomes through Evidence-Based Practice

In healthcare, both care pathways and clinical guidelines serve as essential tools in guiding decisions for optimal patient outcomes. This session will explore the differences between the two, emphasizing how pathways coordinate the entire patient journey—from diagnosis to rehabilitation—across various providers, including physicians, allied health professionals, and O&P practitioners. Using the AFO (Ankle-Foot Orthosis) care pathway as a case study, this session will outline the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats associated with standardized care pathways, exploring how they can demonstrate the clinical and economic value of O&P expertise. Attendees will learn how standardized care pathways improve patient outcomes by ensuring consistency in treatment while underscoring the critical role of O&P professionals in enhancing quality and efficiency throughout the continuum of care.

Breakout #2: Optimizing the O&P Data Ecosystem: A Path Toward Standardization and Evidence-Based Value

Varying data practices and priorities across clinics, manufacturers, payers, and health systems has resulted in inconsistent clinical practices, limited ability to aggregate large-scale data, and challenges in generating robust, real-world evidence. Consequently, O&P has struggled to demonstrate the value of its patient care, products, and technologies to key stakeholders, including payers, policymakers, and regulators. The absence of a unified data strategy, combined with a lack of agreed upon, standardized quality measures, has made it difficult to harness the full potential of data.

The resources provided by the LLPR, along with engaged EHR vendors and mounting pressure for credible evidence, indicate that now is the time for a profession-wide data strategy. In this session, AOPA will present a draft data strategy framework derived from the voice of the profession, facilitate strategy discussion and feedback with industry leaders, and inclusively identify actionable steps with session participants to catalyze an industry-wide data strategy to optimize the O&P data ecosystem.

The Time is Now: How to Build on Recent Successes & New Information

In 2024, there were steps taken to advance the understanding and direction of O&P care. There was the introduction of care pathways and the exploration of value-driven care. Lastly, there was also a monumental shift in the Medicare lower limb prostheses policy that recognized the clinical benefits of select prosthetic components may offer to an entirely new population of patients.
